Dear Parishioners,

The experience of people living with the challenges of homelessness and mental ill-health has been high-lighted in the Australian Catholic Bishops Conferences 2025 Social Justice Statement for the last Sunday in August. Each year since 1940, the Conference has released a statement for reflection and discussion ahead of Social Justice Sunday (August 31st) on a key issue in Australian society. This year's statement is 'Signs of Hope on the Edge: Serving Homeless People with Mental III-Health'.

The above helps us to understand more what the Catholic Church and its followers need to bring to seriously follow Jesus command 'to love one another'.

When four of our Parish Council went to the Italian Social Club in St Albans this week, we were there with many parishes from the West to hear from Joshua Lourensz who is executive director of Catholic Social Services Victoria. Catholic Social Services Vic is the peak body of 40 different Catholic agencies helping the needy in various ways. These 40 agencies are in 150 locations and have simply thousands of paid employees in our State helping in various needs. The Catholic Church is equally the biggest employee of people in Australia with the Woolworths Group – but they are mainly centred on selling food, goods or merchandise!!,

Joshua Lourensz stated rather than the word 'charity' they in their agencies stress more the word 'justice'. Justice is sort of what people deserve whereas 'charity' in a sense goes beyond that! Former Pope Benedict stated that both are inseparable and that charity completes justice. Pope Francis took another slightly different angle in that the needy are the 'suffering Christ' and we as Catholics are called to see Christ in them and gain a mysterious wisdom from those encounters.

When we deal with the 'Good Samaritan;' scenario we are being asked by Christ 'who is my neighbour'? Joshua made the point that where there is service there is my neighbour and through it we create a new neighbour!

On last week's gathering of parishes of the Western suburbs mainly we were being led to the topic of Service within the context of what a Vibrant Parish in the Archdiocese should stand for. Yes, all the following are important: Worship, Evangelisation, and Fellowship but Service is a nonnegotiable - not that the others can be placed second. Part of our service in our parish is through Crisp, Way of the West, Mary Care and St Vincent de Paul, Nursing Homes including the elderly. On last week we were called to open our minds to greater horizons within the sphere of 'service' within our parishes. Accordingly, there was a panel of three parishes informing us of the good things they were doing in service to others. One in line with the Social Justice Sunday Statement ideal next week was the work being done by Clifton Hill Parish (near North Fitzroy) where it was discovered that one in 10 people there suffer with housing stress. Accordingly, there is a big number of homeless in the area or semi homeless/couch surfing etc. A Catholic Samoan family with cooking skills offered to the Clifton Hill Parish a service on the Church grounds. Now I gather from what they say they with parishioner volunteers serve 300 free meals a day to those suffering mainly homelessness or poverty. The reps on the panel stressed that they give and offer dignity to every person who comes seeking their help. Two other parishes Greensborough and Belmont gave very different but equally important work of theirs in service to their Parish and Community: one was meeting the need of 'Mental Health' in their area and the other was offering concrete help with 'Women undergoing Stress'.

SCRIPTURE READINGS:

- **A.** FIRST READING: (from Prophet Isaiah) The author describes a panoramic vision of Jews making their way back from the ends of the earth to worship in the restored city of Jerusalem. They bring with them people from the non-Jewish world to do homage to the one God.
- **B. SECOND READING:** (**Hebrews**) This is a continuation of last Sunday's reading. Discipline is a necessary part of education and training. As a father shows his concern for his son by training him in discipline, so God trains his children through suffering.

C. GOSPEL: (Luke) Jesus refuses to get into the numbers game, or to speculate about matters that are best left to the wisdom and mercy of God. The main thing is: the kingdom is present and the door open. But the door is not so wide that people can saunter casually in at their own convenience; it is a narrow opening through which they must thrust themselves with determination. Besides, the door will not be open indefinitely.

WAY OF THE WEST:

We have now finished this weekend our annual "Way of the West' campaign - so far, the equal of all other years with approx 3,000 goods given by you for distribution to the Asylum Seeker Resource Centre in Footscray and the Brigidine Asylum Seeker Pilot Project. Thanks to all parishioners and school parents.

ARCHBISHOP CAMPAIGN:

Throughout the whole Melbourne Archdiocese this weekend there will be a fundraiser collection. Although a key focus for the Archbishop's Campaign is supporting the formation of new priests and caring for our retired priests, much of the money is also needed to support other key ministries of the Church. Accordingly, this weekend parishioners will be asked to offer a gift to this year's Archbishop Campaign. Parishioners across the Archdiocese will be asked to make a recurring monthly contribution, although one-off donations are gratefully accepted.

Tax-deductible gifts will go to the Archbishop's Charitable Fund which supports:

- Priests Retirement Foundation.
- John Pierce Centre for the hearing impaired
- Melbourne Overseas Mission (our archdiocese has always allowed a few priests to help for a few years in Papua New Guinea and Peru)
- Other deductible gift recipient entities such as Catholic community agencies and community service organisations

Non-deductible gifts will go to the Catholic Archdiocese of Melbourne Religious Projects Fund which supports:

- Seminary education.
- The archbishop's evangelisation initiatives, such as Australian Catholic Youth Festival (late November) By inviting our parishioners to help raise funds to support the important works of the Church in Melbourne you are playing a pivotal role in our future. The Archbishop's Campaign reduces the number of separate special Sunday plate collections in parishes each years.
